MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Friends of the Monmouth Conservation Foundation.

Much has changed in Monmouth County since our founding in1977. A mere seven years after Earth Day was enacted, Monmouth Conservation Foundation's visionary founders saw the urgency of protecting the open lands of a rapidly developing landscape located between New York City and Philadelphia. As the country hummed the popular tune at the time, an Eagle's favorite, MCF became "The New Kid in Town," joining a small group of existing land trusts and dedicating itself exclusively to protecting Monmouth County's threatened landscapes.

As with any 40th birthday, the staff and the board alike reflect both on successes and on what lies ahead. We are humbled by the many thousands of acres our efforts have preserved and by the friends and partners who have helped to make it all possible.

Our accreditation by the Land Trust Accreditation Commission, an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance, ensures excellence in all that MCF does and provides assurances to our public constituency, landowners and donors that our important conservation efforts are effective and will protect and preserve land forever. MCF is one of nine accredited land trusts within the state (we are one of 372 out of 1.363 active land trusts nationwide), and the only one, accredited or not, operating in our county.

The continued threat of development pressure is just one of the challenges we remain dedicated to overcoming. As more land is preserved (still an all-important goal), our focus must also embrace land stewardship to not only uphold the promises made through the conservation agreements we hold, but also to ensure that water quality is protected and wildlife habitat remains intact.


We must make these lands more resilient to the impact of climate change, and help prevent our ever growing needs for energy from having adverse impact.

We are expanding our educational awareness work to build a community that better understands the importance of conservation and takes action in caring for their own backyards in ways that complement Mother Nature by embracing native plants and reducing harmful fertilizers and chemicals that contribute to water pollution.





Today, four decades later, we wear Apple watches, sleep with Apple iPhones, and use Apple iPads to stay current and look back.

Which brings us to Monmouth Conservation Foundation.

It is MCF that has saved some of the farms and farmland that provide not only apples (to eat!) - but also peaches, pumpkins, tomatoes and an endless variety of produce. In fact, the Foundation is currently working to preserve five additional farms: two in Holmdel, one in Howell, one in Colts Neck, and one in Upper Freehold.

Forty years after its founding – and all those other monumental events later – having collaboratively saved over 22,500 acres, Monmouth Conservation Foundation remains steadfast in its mission to: Save Open Space. Create Parks. Preserve Farmland. Protect Wildlife. Safeguard Waterways.

Other recent projects, currently underway, include:

- Creating additions to parks in Aberdeen, Marlboro, Middletown and Neptune Townships and a new park in Red Bank's underserved area. (These parks, and others such as Freneau Woods Park, Huber Woods, Tatum Park, and Turkey Swamp, provide the space for us to play, walk, run, bike, hike, and simply be in nature with our friends and family.)
- Creating corridors connecting Wildlife Management Areas in Millstone Township. Because we are, all of us, guardians of the wildlife that enchants us.
- Safequarding wetland habitat in Rumson and waterfront property in Middletown. These are the wetlands and the waterways that sustain us.

Although it is impossible to predict the significant events that will transpire over the next 40 years, we are certain that into 2057, our descendants will look back on MCF's accomplishments in those 40 ensuing years, with gratitude for the open space, parks, farms, and the natural wonders we preserved and protected for them. To that end, our work is far from finished.

The best news and the one thing that sustains us most – once land is saved, it is saved in perpetuity. For everyone. Forever.



FOCUS ON... PRESERVING & SAFEGUARDING LAND, WATER AND WILDLIFE

WHAT MCF DOES TO PRESERVE AND PROTECT LAND

MCF works in partnership with local governments and the state aiming to create parks, open spaces and preserve farms. MCF also holds easements, either donated or purchased, to protect farms and conserve ecologically significant lands.

ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

We work continuously with landowner partners to ensure that the important natural resources protected by conservation easements are sustained forever. As part of our annual monitoring program, MCF stewardship staff, accompanied by our easement monitoring team, visited 43 easement areas totaling 1,047 acres of preserved open spaces, farmland and natural habitats throughout the county.

Through the provision of our educational collateral and services, MCF encourages stewardship practices such as using native plants, decreasing the use of synthetic fertilizers, and installing rain gardens to protect our waterways. In connection with Earth Day, we distributed one thousand pollinator attracting seed packets.

MCF is uniquely positioned to play a key role in the Rally for the Navesink – a multi-partner initiative focused on improving the water quality of the river. We will conduct outreach and provide education to the population within the watershed on land-based pollution sources, specifically septic system maintenance and livestock waste management. We solicit corporate volunteers to perform stewardship enrichments on conserved properties, for example those performed in 2016 at the NJ Audubon Scudder Preserve in Middletown Township.

LANDOWNER OUTREACH

MCF establishes and maintains relationships with landowners of over 3,000 acres of land, throughout the county, targeted as additions to existing parks and the creation or enlargement of greenways providing connectivity between state, county and local parks and wildlife management areas.

MCF encourages landowner inquiries about preservation opportunities, their relevance and determines mutual interest.

PEOPLE IMPACTS

While protecting large areas of tracts, e.g., acres preserved, is an important objective, an equally important measure is the number of people positively impacted by our work.

The traditional focus of Monmouth Conservation Foundation preserving large tracts of lands in suburbia, has expanded into urban areas throughout the county to establish parks in underserved locations. MCF has been working diligently to make land conservation more relevant to communities not traditionally targeted for conservation. MCF has made it a top priority to work on establishing pocket parks in built-out densely populated residential communities throughout the county.

Recently, in partnership with Asbury Park, Interfaith Neighbors and Monmouth County, MCF has been able to bridge a funding gap to create Springwood Avenue Park in the city's underserved west side. This 1.3 acre park, which opened in 2016, is now a fully developed pocket park serving over 200 households and has attracted over 800 persons from local areas, as well as from afar, to its recent summer concert series. In addition, numerous local churches are now using the outdoor venue for their events.

With MCF and the county's financial assistance, the historic Borough of Allentown, a 0.6 square mile town in Western Monmouth County, purchased a 2.5 acre pocket park in walking distance to its 1,800 inhabitants.

LAND PROTECTION

MCF successfully preserved a combined total of 50 acres in Wall Township with the most recent preservation of Conover's Christmas Tree Farm. The 14-acre pick-your-own Christmas tree farm, rich with history, tradition and fertile soil, was preserved through the farmland preservation program.

MCF is currently working to protect over 1,500 additional acres of land throughout the county in concert with state, county and local preservation plans. These projects focus on protecting headwaters within important watersheds, saving farmland in perpetuity, protecting wildlife habitats and corridors, preserving open spaces and crucial ecosystems and connecting people with the outdoors to include underserved communities.



FOCUS ON...FINANCES

The 2016 organization support and revenue rose significantly over 2015 (\$887,617 vs. \$613,887).


All sources of revenue in 2016 exceeded 2015 with the exception of grants which were down 22% from 2015.

Organization expenses in 2016 were significantly below 2015 (\$858,985 vs \$1,088,319).

Compared to the prior year, 2016 program expenses were down 24%, management and general expenses were down 31%, and fundraising expenses were up slightly by 4%.

Program expenses were lower than anticipated primarily due to delays associated with acquisition closings.

MCF had many pending acquisitions which were to close in 2016 but delayed due to circumstances beyond our control. These deferred acquisition costs in combination with increased income resulted in net assets increasing in 2016 compared to decreasing 2015.
