hen The Unterberg Children's Hospital at Monmouth Medical Center was named through a charitable contribution by Ann and Thomas Unterberg in 2013, it became clear that there was a need to educate the community about the tremendous things happening at the children's hospital. Drink! Italy!"

Empowering Patients, Parents, and the Community

With each fundraising affair hosted and every educational event planned, the Council continues to raise awareness for The Unterberg Children's Hospital within the community. Since the very beginning, they've been putting their efforts to good use by implementing new programs to benefit the hospital's many patients and families.

One such endeavor is Picture My Smile, a 6-month program that gives pediatric photographers, between the ages of 6 and 17, a digital camera to capture the world through their eyes. During that time, participants are able to learn photography tips and tricks through online tutorials with professional photographers and then upload their photos to an online gallery. Photos may also be featured on the Picture My Smile website, and even auctioned at events to benefit the children's hospital.

The Council has also been busy planning and hosting a lecture series on important topics for parents. In February, they hosted their first lecture – Raising Confident Children in a Social Media World. In June, they followed up with a guide for parents that focused on surviving and thriving during the tween and teen years. As the Council continues to inform and educate the community, they have a third lecture scheduled for the fall.

Chance Meeting Leads to ... first new jersey PALLIATIVE CARE OUTPATIENT PROGRAM



Ten years ago, a chance meeting in the hospital cafeteria changed my life...

was new to Monmouth Medical Center. I had been recruited to build programs in geriatrics and palliative care. Most of my days were crazy. I never knew what the day would hold until I got to work and I was usually too busy to break for lunch.

Except for this day...

I stopped in the hospital cafeteria and sat next to an older man who was waiting for his lunch date. We struck up a conversation and I told him about my work at Monmouth. He asked me a lot of interesting guestions about what palliative care was and about why I pursued a fellowship in geriatrics. He was a good listener, and I was a chatterbox. Our conversation was easy and fun. I had no idea at the time that I was speaking to Jack Rudin, or that his lunch date that day was Dr. Frank Vozos. I learned

his identity a few weeks later when the hospital called to tell me Mr. Rudin had made a significant donation to my developing programs.

Jack Rudin was interested in collaborating and bringing people from completely different places together to share their experience and resources for the greater good of our patients. He invited me to New York to meet some of his colleagues and other specialists in the city who were working with and interested in palliative care and geriatrics. With this, he taught me about the importance of working as a team for a common goal. I will be forever grateful for Jack's generosity in sharing his opinions and funding my work over the last 10 years, for this has allowed me to build a Palliative Care and Geriatric Medicine program at Monmouth Medical Center that has touched thousands of lives.

Today, Monmouth Medical Center is home to the first palliative care outpatient program in the State of New Jersey, the region's only state of the art Geriatrics Emergency Medicine (GEM) Unit, and a vibrant outpatient geriatrics practice with three fellowship trained geriatricians, on-site social work and nursing expertise. It is formally designated as a NICHE (Nurses Improving Care for Healthsystem Elders) hospital, with a cohort of geriatric resource nurses who work throughout the hospital to ensure that specialized geriatrics care is available on all of our units. Our next project is to open an ACE (Acute Care for the Elderly) unit, geared specifically for the frail older adult facing acute hospitalization and staffed with dedicated social work, physical therapy, dieticians, pharmacists, nursing and medical care.

All of this work requires a team, like Jack showed me all of those years ago. It mandates that we work together across disciplines and institutions to share ideas and resources for the greater good of our patients. Our team meets every Tuesday to discuss the needs of our growing program and also every patient that is entered into it. We call this team meeting "Rudin Rounds".

Monmouth Medical Center is proud to recognize Nancy and Michael Del Priore as the recipients of the *"Community Leadership Award"* at the 2015 Crystal Ball. n 1975, at the age of one, the Del Priore's first son, Michael, was nursed back to health at **Monmouth Medical Center's** intensive care unit after a serious illness. A year later, their second son, Mark, was born at MMC. The history with **Monmouth Medical Center** has continued to present day with all four of their grandchildren being born at the hospital. However, the pivotal event was in 1993 when Michael was on a routine business trip and he experienced sudden, tremendous pain. He returned home immediately and went directly to Monmouth Medical Center where physicians diagnosed a perforated gall bladder. The condition would have been fatal had Dr. Michael A. Goldfarb, immediate past chair of Surgery, not operated right away. *"I guess you could say that I wouldn't be here today if it weren't for Monmouth Medical Center and Dr. Goldfarb," Michael said.*

Feeling very grateful, Michael and Nancy wanted to give back. They were referred to the Monmouth Medical Center Foundation and to date Michael has been a member of the Board of Trustees. Over the years, Michael and Nancy have contributed significantly to two separate building projects, helped recruit other members to the Foundation Board, and have not only supported but attended many of our events.

Although Michael and Nancy now call Florida their primary residence, they continue to support the hospital. They have recently joined the **Cranmer Legacy Society** by including **Monmouth Medical Center** in their will. They joined this committed group of individuals knowing that their contribution will continue to ensure world class medical care for not only their family, children, and grandchildren but for all Monmouth County families.

ore than 400 walkers on 41 teams recently joined together on the Long Branch promenade for the eighth annual Big Steps for Little Feet Walk to benefit the Hirair and Anna Hovnanian Foundation Regional Newborn Center (RNC) at The Unterberg Children's Hospital at Monmouth Medical Center.

Underwritten by Pediatrix Medical Group, the record-setting event raised over \$100,000 to support the purchase of a neonatal transporter and related pulmonary equipment designed to transport critically ill infants when they require the highest level of care that can only be provided at a level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

Additional funding for the neonatal transporter has been provided through a grant of \$40,000 from the Will Rogers Institute, a program of the Will Rogers Motion Picture Pioneers Foundation, which equips hospitals providing critical care to premature infants with ventilator equipment and critical care pulmonary services.
